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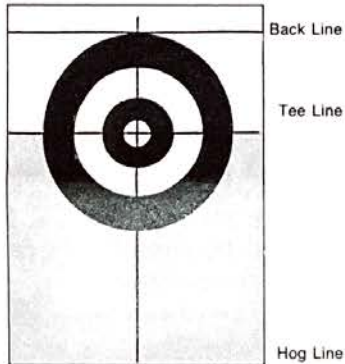
Attention Curlers

The Canadian Curling Association has adopted the 3 Rock Free Guard Zone Rule for play at the 1994 C.C.A. National Championships.

The Curling Committee of the Prince George Golf and Curling Club at its September 9, 1993 meeting approved the adoption of the 3 Rock Free Guard Zone Rule for regular league play at the Club. The rule will apply to all the Men's Ladies' and Mixed leagues for the 1993-1994 season.

FREE GUARD ZONE RULE DESCRIPTION:

- a) The area between the hog line and tee line excluding the house shall be the Free Guard Zone. Meaning the area depicted in the following diagram.



Interpretation

A stone which comes to rest outside the rings but touching the tee line is not in the Free Guard Zone.

- b) Any stone(s) located within the Free Guard Zone shall not be removed from play until the delivery of the fourth and subsequent stones of the end. Meaning the lead of the team holding the hammer, with his last rock, may remove a stone from the Free Guard Zone.

Interpretation

This includes your own team's stones.

Penalty

If a stone(s) in the Free Guard Zone is removed from play

prior to the delivery of the fourth stone of the end, the non-offending team may:

- i) if it is to the advantage of the non-offending team, they may waive the Free Guard Zone penalty and continue play as if there had not been an infraction.
 - ii) remove the delivered stone from play and replace all displaced stationary stones to their original position.
- c) If, in the delivery of the third stone of an end a stone not in the Free Guard Zone is hit initially and as a result a stone in the Free Guard Zone is removed from play, the non-offending team may:
- i) if it is to the advantage of the non-offending team, they may waive the Free Guard Zone penalty and continue play as if there had not been an infraction.
 - ii) remove the delivered stone from play and replace the stone removed from the Free Guard Zone to its original position. The stone that was initially hit will remain where it finally comes to rest.
- d) After delivery of each of the first two stones of an end it is the responsibility of the throwing team to skip to ensure agreement with the opposing skip as to whether or not the stone has come to rest in the Free Guard Zone. If they cannot agree, they may make the determination by using the six foot measuring stick. If the position of another stone hinders the use of the six foot measure they may reposition this stone, complete the measurement and replace the stone to its original position. Meaning you can measure the first two stones of an end to determine if they are in or out of the Free Guard Zone.

- e) In all other respects the normal Rules of Play shall apply.

The Curling Committee

EXAMPLE 1



- Stones are in the positions above
- Take out being played on the rock in the house

• Result: both the rock in the house and the rock in the Free Guard Zone are removed from play. The shooter rolls out of play as well.

Option 1



- If it is to the non-offending team's advantage, leave the stones where they came to rest as a result of the shot.

• In this example no stones would be in play

Option 2



- Is to replace the stone removed from the Free Guard Zone to its original position.

• The rock in the house initially hit by the shooter will remain where it came to rest. In this case out of play.

EXAMPLE 2:

Option 1



- Stones are in the same position as in Example 1.
- Take out being played on the rock in the house.
- Result both the rock in the house and the rock in the Free Guard Zone are removed from play. The shooter remains in play on the tee line in the house.

Option 2



- Is to replace the stone removed from the Free Guard Zone to its original position.
- The shooter which came to rest in the house on the tee line is removed from play.
- The rock in the house initially hit by the shooter will remain where it came to rest. In this case out of play.

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HOUSE RULES

for all "House" Leagues

Revised 1988

1. PAID spare curlers may play any position, providing they are replacing the missing curler from that rink, or a lower position.
2. A curler who curls in any one of the house leagues in our Club can spare at any time (social spare), but **MUST** play LEAD.
3. (a) Ladies may not spare in Men's leagues.
(b) Men may not spare in Ladies' leagues.
4. No person is allowed on the ice with street shoes or boots.
5. In Club curling, when curling with three players, Lead and Second must throw **THREE** rocks each.
6. In Mixed curling, Ladies and Men **MUST** play alternate positions. Man or Lady may skip (in the event that you play with three players only, you can curl your regular positions).
7. (a) Men's and Ladies' Leagues - All games will be eight (8) ends.
(b) Mixed Leagues - All games will be eight (8) ends in length.
8. Ensure that the ice is cleaned after **EVERY** draw. **WINNERS** are responsible for cleaning the ice.

Any violation of these rules could result in a game forfeit. If you are aware of a violation prior to commencement of play, same should be resolved at that time. However, a written protest can be made within one week of the alleged violation (i.e., protest must be made prior to the same draw in the following week) to the Curling Committee.

Note: C.C.A. or C.L.C.A. Rules apply to all **BONSPIELS** and **PLAYDOWNS**.

PLEASE KEEP THE ICE SURFACE CLEAN

1. No street shoes allowed on ice surface.
2. **WINNERS** will clean ice.
3. Ensure ice is cleaned after **EVERY** draw.
4. Pull rocks out from the boards, remove foam bumpers, sweeping out ends and corners. Rocks are **NOT** to be removed from ice surface.
5. Clean areas along sides of sheets prior to using mop.
6. Mop to be used over entire ice surface.
7. Take down score - ready for next draw.

A little time, effort and co-operation will help keep our ice clean.

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From the Icemaker

The 1993-94 curling season will be underway by the time you read this article. I would like to take this time to explain how curling ice is made from compressor start-up to the first rock being thrown.

Compressor Start-up and Preparation for Flooding

We first start by sweeping and mopping the floors, resetting the dividers and setting the unit heaters to a temperature of 38°F.

The compressor, constituting two 6-cylinder mycoms in the new building and one 8-cylinder in the Annex, are serviced over the summer months to ensure a trouble-free start in the fall. It usually takes three to five days (depending on outside temperatures) to cool down the brine running through the floor to a temperature of 18°F.

Once this is done, we are ready to set centre pins and hacks. These are set in place and each sheet is sealed with a fine spray of water until we have accumulated approximately ¼ inch of ice over the entire surface. This is usually accomplished after six coats. We are now ready to begin flooding.

Flooding

We begin by using a ¾ inch hose with a 1 inch plastic tube attached to the end of it. Starting at one end, the flood tube is brought from side to side along the ice surface, overlapping approximately 16 inches a pass until you have completed the entire sheet. This takes about 15 minutes per sheet and leaves 1/8 inch of water, taking approximately four hours to freeze.

Each flood seeks its own level running off the high spots into the low spots where it then freezes. Flooding is continued until you no longer have high or low spots. Fortunately, both the new building and the annex have reasonably level floors. The new building takes 12 floods and the Annex takes 10. Having reached a level ice surface, we are now ready to paint the ice to give it its uniform white colour.

Painting

Although there are a variety of ice paints on the market, I have found the most success with White Ice. It comes in a

powdered form which is then mixed with water in a 45 gallon-drum and pumped from there through a ¾ inch hose and sprayed onto the ice surface with a jet nozzle. Each sheet is covered two times to achieve a uniform white sheet of ice.

After this has been completed, the paint must be sealed down by continuously covering each sheet with a fine spray until you have built approximately ¼ inch of ice. The reason for this procedure is that if too much water is put down at one time the paint will lift, causing greying and shadows.

We now give it one more flood and are ready to lay ribbons and cut and paint circles.

Circles and Ribbons

We start with the circles which are cut with a router. The router is placed in a jig much like a compass and grooves are cut at one, four, eight, and twelve foot intervals approximately 3/8 inch deep. Each end of the sheet is also routered to define the areas for rocks not in play. Once this is completed, we are ready to paint. The paint is applied with brushes and rollers with the routered areas filled in by using an oil can with the appropriate colour. The painted areas are then sealed with a fine jet spray to prevent the paint from lifting. We are now able to lay ribbons.

We use ½ inch ribbons for the back, tee and centreline, with 4 inch ribbon at the hog line. These are first placed in water, then pulled to predetermined marks on the dividers and pressed and frozen to the ice surface. These are then sealed to prevent floating. As soon as the ribbons and paint have been sufficiently sealed we apply our final four floods.

We now have a complete sheet of curling ice. It is then made ready for play by cutting hacks, cleaning, blading and pebbling.

I hope this article has given you some insight into how our curling ice is made. On behalf of my staff, I extend best wishes for a successful 1993-94 curling season.

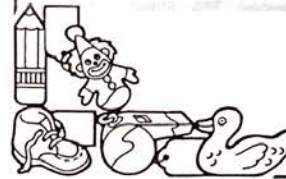
Day Care Service
