

TIP OF THE MONTH

Lately I have seen a lot of people hitting some poor shots around the green (chilly dips, etc.). Usually, this is caused by a too long and too fast backswing that results in de-acceleration at the ball. To correct this, take a slow backswing and shorten it relative to the distance to travel and you will now be able to accelerate through the shot for a better result. All golf shots need to be hit with acceleration to be effective. Try this tip: starting from the tee as you progress down the fairway, the closer you get to the hole, the slower your backswing should get.

Course Report

The following are the highlights from a brief report from Jim Ross. This is for the benefit of our members and a more detailed report is being prepared for the benefit of Murray Kutyn and our directors.



Jim was at our course on August 11 & 12 to assess the condition of our course and to offer recommendations on how we could better prepare our course for the up and coming winter season. Jim is with the Prairie Turfgrass Research Centre at Olds College. He has previously worked as a golf course superintendent and has been involved with the Research Institute for the past 5 years.

The majority of the injury was a result of ice cover injury that occurred during the winter and spring. Rainfall of December 8-10 created conditions where ice formed on many of the greens which resulted in the damage. From our research conducted at the PTRC last winter, we found that Poa annua (annual bluegrass) began to rapidly decline after 30 days of ice cover and by 60 days was completely killed. Creeping bentgrass, on the other hand, is much more tolerant of ice cover and can resist injury for more than 90 days.

Murray mentioned that those greens that completely cleared of snow during the rain event came through the winter quite normally. However, those greens that did not clear, iced up severely and suffered considerable injury. Murray mentioned that rain events were common and, in fact, had occurred three times in the last seven years.

There are essentially three ways to deal with the ice. One is to prevent an ice cover from forming by removing the snow and ice as it builds up during the rain event. The second alternative is to remove the ice at around the 30-day mark following the rain. The third alternative is to prevent ice from forming by placing an impervious cover over the turf prior to winter. All three alternatives have their drawbacks.

Ice removal during the rain event is only possible if there is sufficient time to remove it before it freezes to the putting greens. Removing ice at the 30-day mark may expose the annual bluegrass to very cold temperatures which will cause freezing injury. The covers will only be effective if they prevent water from entering through the covers or under the edges. The expense of purchasing and installing the covers is also an obvious drawback.

Besides injury caused by ice cover, freezing injury in the transition period from winter to spring is a concern. From our research, we also found that annual bluegrass was very susceptible to injury when subjected to cold temperatures that were preceded by a warm period. Plants will lose their ability to resist freezing injury if they begin to grow during this period. At this point, we recommend to keep plants cold and dormant until the risk of cold temperatures (-8 Celsius or colder) has passed. In order to do this, an insulating material can be placed under the impervious cover. This will keep the turf cold and dormant, as well as protecting the turf from rain that turns to ice.

We discussed a number of alternatives for insulating materials that would be available around Prince George. No doubt some experimentation would be necessary.

Curling Report

It's hard to believe, but at the time of writing this, the curling ice in the new building will be almost ready to use. We are hopeful that the First Annual Summer Bonspiel will proceed as planned the last weekend in August and become a popular event. The Superleague is planning to start an early round-robin for those competitive curlers who want to get an early start. Regular league play will start as usual in early October.

We are sure that most curlers realize that participation has been declining over the past few years. This obviously affects revenue. With this in mind, the Finance Committee has recommended to the Board that we do not put ice into the old building this year. This will result in a substantial cost savings and with the curling numbers from last year we can accommodate all curlers in the new building if we make a few adjustments in scheduling. It should be mentioned that nothing will be taken from the old building and ice can be installed if curling participation increases. We are hopeful that the Scott Tournament of Hearts will make more people aware of this sport and increase participation. Also, the Curling Coordinator and Curling Committee along with Curl BC and Curl Canada will continue to focus on the promotion of curling as a fun, affordable sport.

There are five leagues that will be affected by having only 8 sheets of ice: Monday Men's, Construction League, Friday Mixed, Legion & Tuesday Seniors. In the case of Monday Men's (44 teams) we are proposing that we alternate the 12 team overflow to Wednesday night; Construction League (20 teams) would also alternate 4 teams to Wednesday night; Friday Mixed we would like to see alternate 6:30 and 8:30 which would make a bigger league; Legion League (24 teams) would alternate at 9:00 Sunday or at 1:30 and Tuesday Seniors (22 teams) alternate either earlier or later at their choice.

We hope that the curlers will support these necessary changes but when you see the financial picture, we are confident you will appreciate the need for cost reductions. Please contact Murray Kutyn, John Thompson or myself if you have any questions. The Curling Office will be open by the time you get this message and on behalf of the club, we wish you a fun and successful curling season.


